Famous Johnstons
Hobart Johnstone Whitley—The Father of Hollywood
 by Bart Johnston©

The U.S. has been blessed with an army of Canadian immigrants seeking their fortune south of the border, but one left his mark in ways of no other. Combining a keen business sense with engineering, politics and salesmanship, he created over 140 towns from Chicago to Los Angeles.

Hobart Johnstone Whitley was born in Toronto in 1847, to a gentleman farmer, Joseph Whitley, whose own father, Nicholas, had been a decorated naval officer and British M.P from Liverpool. Nicholas had arranged for his son, Joseph, to obtain a post in the new Canadian government. Joseph arrived in Canada with fourteen servants but soon found country life and farming more appealing than government. He met and married Eleanor Johnstone, daughter of Colonel William Johnstone of the British Army. Joseph's new father-in-law was descended from the Johnstones of Annandale, and had been posted to British North America to deter a U.S. invasion.

Joseph's son Hobart, known as "HJ" to all, was the last of seven children. While young, he lost four of his siblings to a cholera epidemic due to bad water on the farm. At his mother's insistence, the family moved to Flint, Michigan to educate the children and then moved back to the farm. When he was just eighteen, tragedy struck again as both parents were killed when a train hit their carriage at a blind crossing. Shortly after he lost his parents, he left the farm for business college in Toronto but memories of the vigor and ambition of the Michigan business community lured him back to the States after graduation and he headed for Chicago. There, the wealthy HJ started two retail businesses and met many railroad executives. He impressed them and became a landman for both the Chicago Rock Island and Northern Pacific railroads. *(Continued on page 5.)*

Have you checked the National Archives Catalog lately? A wonderful series of records is being transferred to the Kansas City branch that could be a boon to opening some brick walls we all encounter. These are the Alien Files or A-Files. The Immigrations and Naturalization Service began issuing *Alien Registration Numbers* in 1940 and then in 1944 began attaching these numbers to files for any alien not yet naturalized that passed through the immigration and inspection process. These files contain a wealth of data such as visas, photographs, affidavits, correspondence, birth and baptismal records.

So who might be found in these records? Any alien who registered in 1940 and came back to INS after April 1, 1944 for some reason other than naturalization. These are not naturalization records and if a person had become naturalized prior to 1940 or between 1940 and 1944 or they had applied for naturalization, they will not be in these records. The Archives is under a 100 year rule as to opening these files and are currently on the 1909 and prior birth year.

To search these records, go to <http://www.archives.gov/research/arc/>. In the search box type *Alien Case Files*. the *Search Within Series* link in the “includes” section to get to a search box where you can enter a surname. Be sure to change your “Limit Your Results To” to a higher number if using a common name. You can open each of the results and then open “Scope and Content” to determine if this is the correct ancestor you are searching for. If you are lucky enough to find an ancestor, the link is included to contact the archives and the General Notes section tells you what to include in your request. They will get back to you generally within a week to let you know what the file contains and the cost of getting copies.

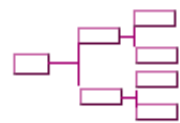
The Library of Ireland has a number of on-line books about the Scots-Irish. Look them up at <http://www.libraryireland.com/ScotchIrish/Home.php>.

This is the Upper Canada (Ontario) Criminal Database. Only those of us searching our ancestors are excited to find their names on such a list.

Got Kentucky ancestors? Then you want to check out the Kentucky Historical Society’s website. You can spend hours going through their digital collection. Find them at <http://history.ky.gov/>.

All railroads needed customers to survive and the best way to build a customer base was to build towns along the tracks. HJ would identify where the towns should be built, buy additional land, lay out the streets and build a hotel and bank, the two most important businesses in a growing community. In Oklahoma and North Dakota, he laid out the territorial capitals and turned down offers to become governor of both territories. In North Dakota he was a friend of rancher, Teddy Roosevelt. Teddy even taught Mrs. Whitley to shoot at his ranch and affectionately called her “Little Lady.”

After his railroad career ended, HJ saw infinite potential for his skills and talents in the Golden State. He discovered Southern California in the late 1880s while on honeymoon with his second wife, Margaret Ross. One morning while riding, they met a Chinese worker with a load of firewood in the hills where the Hollywood sign is today. The laborer, asked what he was doing, replied, “Up early, work hard, haully wood.” When naming his new town, HJ remembered that Chinese woodcutter’s turn of phrase and modified it to Hollywood in honor of his British ancestry.

Whitley developed tens of thousands of acres in California. Hollywood was his first and best known and Whitley Heights, in Hollywood, was his best. He sent his architects to Italy and Spain to study how they built in the hills overlooking the ocean and used their ideas in his homes. Whitley Heights became the first Beverly Hills, with residents such as Jean Harlow, Charlie Chaplin, W.C. Fields, Rudolph Valentino and Bette Davis. The very first movie shot in Hollywood was on his estate in 1911. Whitley Heights changed California architecture from Victorian homes in the valleys to Mediterranean hillside homes and is on the National Register of Historic Places.

In 1909 HJ and his partners bought the 47,500-acre Van Nuys Ranch and built the towns of Van Nuys, Reseda and Canoga Park. He then bought 32,000 acres on which he built Corcoran. He built his trademark banks and hotels along with HJ Whitley Co., a jewelry store so famous it was known as the Tiffany’s of the West. Later, HJ and partners developed the 400-acre Hollywoodland. In order to promote this tract, he built a huge sign on a hill with white letters spelling Hollywoodland. Eventually the sign needed to be demolished for safety reasons but the mayor of Hollywood recognized that it had become part of the landscape and had it rebuilt without the last four letters: “Hollywood.” HJ laid out many famous streets, including Sunset Boulevard, Rodeo Drive, and the Ridge Drive. He also partnered with William Mulholland in developing the L.A. water project, which was the subject of the movie, “Chinatown.”

Hobart Johnstone Whitley, at the age of 83, died in 1931 at the home of his son. He had lived by the morals and ethics passed on to him as a lad in Ontario, and often had told others, “Those who say they can and those that say they cannot are both right . . . the words you say will either put you over or hold you in bondage.”

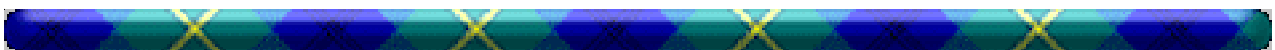

A Special Day - Glengarry Highland Games - July 30th, 2011

The Glengarry Highland Games have been held annually for the past 64 years in Maxville, Ontario, a small town located between Ottawa and Cornwall. This is the centre of Glengarry; a rural region with a deep Scottish heritage. These games are billed as the largest in North America, drawing thousands of spectators and competitors. There are Highland Dance Competitions for all age and skill levels; Heavyweight Championships for both men and women; and The North American Pipe Band Championships. In addition there are fiddling and music demonstrations as well as all manners of crafts and concession booths. One of the highlights is the Massed Highland Fling and Massed Bands with over 60 pipe bands playing in unison; a truly impressive sight.

The Games theme was “The Year of the Clans” with representative booths and tents filling 2 buildings! And it held special significance for Clan Johnston/e. The Governor General of Canada and his wife; Their Excellencies the Right Honourable David and Mrs. Sharon Johnston (see Spur & Phoenix Winter 2010) were scheduled to officially open the games. Given the “Year of the Clan” theme; their advance party asked if the Johnston Clan would be in attendance.

So with short notice, Nikki and I scrambled to get to Maxville for the Saturday set-up. In addition, Bart and Lee Johnston answered the call and drove up from Vermont with even less notice! We pulled it together with a very presentable booth and a proud march in the Clan parade. Aye Ready!

The grandstands were full for the Opening Ceremonies and His Excellency the Governor General gave a moving speech about his Scottish heritage and his connection with the people of Canada, as well as the importance of the Glengarry Games. Following the Opening Festivities, Their Excellencies visited the Clan Johnston/e booth.

Their Excellencies were very warm and immediately put us all at ease. When David Johnston was appointed to the position of Governor General one of our Canadian members, Carol Koeslag, sent him a copy of “The Gentle Johnston/es” book by the late Justice Russell Honey. As it turns out, His Excellency has used this book in researching his genealogy and ancestry in the Dumfries region of Scotland. He even sported our clan tie! It was all very exciting and we were honoured to meet our Governor General and his wife.

This year’s Glengarry Highland Games were very well attended and we had steady traffic all day at the booth. Many visitors registered and we hope to have several serious prospects for membership. We have almost exhausted our supplies of brochures and information so we hope that this will plant the seeds of interest for many people in our Clan.

Overall the day was a huge success and we expect to prioritize the Glengarry Highland Games in the years ahead. We encourage all Clan members to plan a trip to these games. 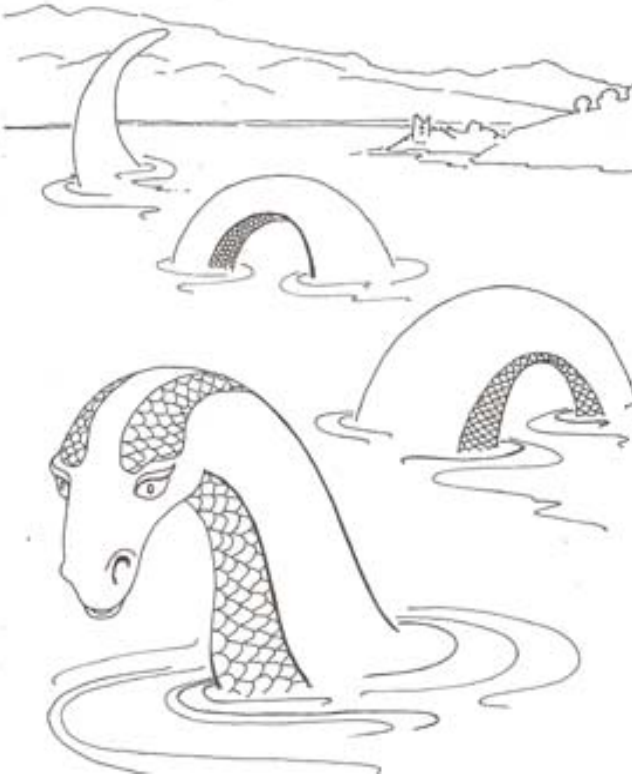
