Not familiar with ahnentafels? Once you know how to read them, they are pretty simple. You pick any person on the list. Take 2X the number that precedes that person and you have their father. (#2x2=4 Therefore, #4 on the list is #2's father.) Take 2X + 1 and you have their mother. (#2x2 + 1 = 5 Therefore, #5 is #2's mother.)

Famous Johnstons

Arrol-Johnston, Britain's First Motorcar

In 1895, the motorcar was unknown in Scotland; the speed limit for carriages in Glasgow was four miles per hour. George Johnston imported a Panhard with a barrel of petrol and became the first Scot to receive a speeding ticket. When a law is to be broken in Scotland, you can find a Border clansman ready to do it!

Johnston was a native of Glasgow, son of Rev. James Johnston, the best known Presbyterian minister in the city. George, born in 1855, became a successful engineer, designing railroad locomotives when the internal combustion engine came on the scene. He began work on his own petrol-powered vehicle, the first built in Britain, and by 1895 was ready for financial backing. He joined with Sir William Arrol, the famous bridge builder who built the Tay Rail Bridge and the Tower Bridge in London, to begin the Mo-Car syndicate.

Their first effort was the six-passenger Dogcart, named for a popular carriage used on estates. This wood-bodied car had a ten-hp, four-cylinder engine and was produced for years. Mo-Car became Arrol-Johnston and they expanded their models. In 1903, Johnston left to form the All British Car Co. which built a huge eight-cylinder 58-hp engine to power the vehicle. The company became a spectacular failure after three years of production while Arrol-Johnston, prospered. Dogcarts were being sold around the empire. In 1913, A-J, as it was known, built a new factory near Dumfries. This was the first concrete and steel factory in Britain, a copy of Henry Ford's plant in Michigan which built Model Ts.





In 1907, Ernest Shackleton asked A-J to build a vehicle which could be driven to the South Pole. It was impossible to test the vehicle adequately in Britain prior to the voyage and the air-cooled engine proved troublesome in extreme cold. The tires were too narrow for the snow but it did work well running supplies from the ship over the ice to the base camp. This tray- backed vehicle was the prototype of today's pickup. With modifications the A-J became the first off-road vehicle and was produced for the extreme heat of the Egyptian desert.

As Johnston left A-J, Sir William Beardmore, shipbuilding tycoon, bought a controlling interest. They built bigger and better vehicles up to forty hp. In WWI the engineers at A-J helped to design a 500-hp long-range bomber engine that would power the Beardmore bomber to Germany and back. Arrol-Johnston merged with Aster of Wembley to form Arrol-Aster in 1927. Sales fell and the company failed during the great depression in 1931.

After All British failed in 1908, Johnston left Scotland for Mexico where he managed a mining company for twenty years. The man once known as, "Britain's Henry Ford", returned to Edinburgh where he lived in obscurity until his death in 1945, never writing his memoirs, never illuminating his creative genius.

One of Scotland's best singer-songwriters died January 4 in England. In the 70s, he was creator of Stealers Wheel and their hit "Stuck in the Middle with You" which parodied Dylan. In 1978, he went solo with the hit album "City to City" which made it to No. 1 with the single "Baker Street", featuring Raphael Ravenscroft's wailing sax.

Growing up in Paisley with an alcoholic father, he knew the dark side of life. Eventually, the alcohol destroyed Gerry's career. We can only wonder how far he could have gone with his talent and a voice Rolling Stone once described as "the dim dawn after a dark night of the soul."

"The Scottish Studies Foundation is a Canadian charitable organization established to encourage research, both inside and outside universities, in Scottish culture -- history, literature, religion, art, law, and Scottish migrations to North America; and to publish historical studies and documents relating to Scottish culture and migrations.

Our present emphasis is aimed at raising the awareness of the Scottish heritage in Canada through various levels of education including the funding of academic scholarships in Scottish Studies in Canada and Scotland.

The Foundation supports an office at the University of Guelph to handle enquiries regarding the University's Scottish Studies Program and is active in raising funds to obtain additional materials for the University's rare book and manuscript collection.

The Foundation also funds the publishing of "The International Journal of Scottish Studies" and financially supports Canadian and Scottish-related conferences."

The foundation also organizes a number of events such as the Annual Tall Ship Cruise out of Toronto Harbour. This year the cruise will take place on Sept. 4, 2011.

Red Hawthorn Clan Johnston/e Plant Badge

The Red Hawthorn

A plant badge is worn on a tam or hat and helps to identify the person as a member of a particular clan.

The full name of the Red Hawthorn is Crataegus Erythrocarpa Ashe, a perennial that is, generally, a very dense shrub or small tree.

The leaf is approximately 2-4 inches long, alternate, serrate and lobed, subtending long thorns. The green leaves picks up traces of red, purple and maroon in fall.

The white, five-petal flower blooms in spring, generally within the first two weeks of May, giving it it's nickname of "Mayflower". In the Scottish Highlands, the flowers may be seen as late as the middle of June. The brilliant red fruit (1/4 to 1/2 inch in diameter) start forming in late September or early October and help feed wildlife through the winter. The white hawthorn flower is the State Flower of Missouri. There are over 1,000 different species of hawthorn.

Hawthorn is planted near the grave of King Arthur at Glastonbury Abby.



The god Thor created the hawthorn tree with a zap of lightning Greeks burned hawthorn wood at weddings and gave the blossoms to the bride and groom for their safety. The hawthorn protected the womb of the bride and encouraged fertility. Hawthorn leaves were put into the cradle of newborn infants to protect the children and the house from demonic spirits and witches.

The symbol of the minor Roman goddess Cardea, who presided over marriage and babies, using the branches and leaves of the Hawthorn tree as her tools. She was called "White Goddess" after the white buds of the hawthorn. The "Crown of Thorns" worn by Jesus, was made of hawthorn.

FOLKLORE ABOUT HAWTHORN

Joseph of Arimathea visited Glastonbury with the Holy Grail and thrust his staff into Wearyall Hill, which then grew into the original thorn tree.

The Faires are said to love the hawthorn tree. Cutting down their hawthorn tree would bring you bad luck.

In Gaelic folklore, hawthorn (in Scottish Gaelic, "Sgitheach" and in Irish, "Sceach") marks the entrance to the otherworld.

Very unlucky to cut the Hawthorn tree at any other time than when it is in bloom, which at this time it is commonly cut and decorated as a May Bush for Beltane, an ancient Celtic fire festival.

Charms made of the hawthorn were used against witchcraft and sorcery.

"Ne'er cast a cloot til Mey's oot" - A Scottish Highland warning to not shed any cloots (clothes) before the summer has fully arrived and May flowers (hawthorn blossoms) are in full bloom.

Hawthorn could heal a broken heart and was an emblem of hope.

Paul Bunyan always used a big hawthorn tree as a back-scratcher.



Information on Payment of Dues: When, How and Where

There seems to be some confusion concerning how much, when, who to make checks out to and where to send the check. Of course, if you pay through the web site, via PayPal, that isn't so much of a problem. But, try to remember to include your Membership #.

Dues are expected by the beginning of CJA's fiscal year for the upcoming year. CJA's fiscal year starts on October 1 each year. It doesn't matter when you originally joined. New members who joined after April 1 of the year have dues paid through September 30th of the following year. That avoids them paying for less than a half year before having to pay again. This is because, many folks join at Games during the Games' season, April through summer and early fall.

Single membership is \$20.00 per year. Member and spouse is \$25.00 per year.

If sending checks in US funds, make checks payable to CJA only. Then mail appropriate paperwork to the Registrar in the US. If mailing Canadian funds, make checks payable to Paul Johnston, being sure to allow for exchange rates and mail to his address in Ontario. Paul will have the funds converted to US dollars and forward to the Registrar and Treasurer. Addresses are listed in the newsletter in the Council listings, **also** on the web page.

Life membership is rather self explanatory. If you are 60 years old or older, Life membership is \$200.00. If you are 59 years old or younger, Life membership is \$250.00.

Here is where the confusion starts. We do not have a Lifetime Membership for Spouses of Life or Regular members. If a spouse wishes to be a Life Member, they must pay either the \$200 for 60 plus, or, \$250 for the 59 and under fees. If a spouse of a Life Member wishes to be a voting member of CJA, they are required to pay \$10.00 per year for that privilege. However, the main family member MUST BE currently paid or a Life Member. If the CJA member is not a currently paid member and not a Life member, a spouse can not have membership without paying the full \$20.00 per year.

That being said, a spouse is a full member when the husband or wife original member pays \$25.00 a year dues for Member and Spouse. It's really not that complicated.

<u>It is not acceptable</u> to add \$10 to the payment for Life Membership for a Life Membership for the spouse. It doesn't work that way. Recorded spouses must pay \$10 per year after full payment of the Life Membership is paid for the original member. Spouses do not get separate membership numbers. They have the same number as their husband or wife who is the original registered member.

If you wish your child to be a recorded member of CJA with his or her own membership number, the fee is \$ 5.00 per year and they must be 18 years old or younger. A person does not have to be Johnston descendant to be a member.



The custom of giving eggs at the time of the Spring Equinox was known to the early Egyptians, Persians, Greeks, Romans, Gauls and many other people. This ancient fertility symbol was adapted by early Christianity in connection with the miracle of the Resurrection and the Feast of Eggs became attached to the celebration of Easter. In Scotland eggs were also used in the Beltane rites (1 May), and like bannocks, were rolled downhill in imitation of the movement of the sun. In Christian times, the rolling of the egg is supposed to represent the rolling away of the the stone from the tomb of the risen Christ.

The practice of colouring the eggs is also ancient. The Persians dyed theirs red, and still use coloured eggs representing the flowers of the field. In Scotland, country bairns used to gather whin blossoms and other growing things with which to dye their eggs. Commercial Easter Eggs seem to dominate now-a-days but it is far more fun for bairns, of all ages, to make the real thing! Eggs are traditionally given out on Easter Sunday and lets revive the practise of rolling your Pasch (Scots for Easter) Egg.

Easter Eggs - take as many eggs as necessary, 1 pt of water, 2 teaspoonfuls salt and for decoration: onion skins, flower petals, cochineal or other colouring matter for dyeing. Put eggs, dyeing material and salt in a pan - bring to the boil slowly and simmer for about 20 minutes. The dyed eggs can be further decorated with paint and crayons with drawings and patterns.
