The Council of Clan Johnston/e in America is pleased to introduce you to our new President, J.J. Johnston and his wife Beverly, of San Antonio, Texas.


J.J. was recently elected to the President's position at the AGM in Pleasanton, CA the first weekend in September.

### **Welcome and Opening Remarks**

Secretary Valerie Ensor called the meeting to order and thanked the attendees for coming. Immediate Past President Lindsey Johnstone due to health issues, had to leave his Council role sooner than his term and it was noted that elections to fill positions, including Lindsey's, would be held during the meeting. Valerie thanked Lindsey Johnstone for his past service as Council Member.

### **Quorum Call**

There were **6 members** present, including 1 Council member. **149 consenting Proxies** were reported by Secretary Valerie Ensor. New York state law requires 10% for a quorum. 364 total paid members divided by 155 present, including proxies, equals 43%, establishing the necessary quorum.

### **Report of Nominations Committee and Election of Officers**

Valerie read the minutes from the 2013 Annual Meeting and offered a copy of the 2014 Merchandise Manager or Registrar's Reports at the meeting. The Treasurer's report was also available, upon request, and all will be posted on the CJA website. Sally Epler made a motion to approve and accept the minutes, seconded by Diana Freeland.

A copy of the agenda was provided to attendees, reminding them of the Nominations Committee selections, including J.J. Johnston, currently serving as Vice President West, who agreed to step forward and finish the remaining one year term vacated by Lindsey Johnstone which leaves the Vice President West position open. The Newsletter Editor role was also noted as an open role. A motion by Sally proposed accepting the slate of officers as presented and Bruce Wexler seconded; the motion passed.

To advise everyone what the open roles entail, Valerie read the descriptions from the bylaws, followed by asking for any nominations from the floor to fill the vacant roles. The meeting proceeded with no volunteers from the floor. Scott Klein motioned to approve the slate of officers as presented and Karen Klein seconded; the motion passed.

### **New Business:**

It was noted the Annual General Meeting will be announced in the future by incoming President J.J. Johnston. There was a reminder that anyone hosting or having interest in hosting a CJA tent should contact the Membership Commissioner, Cathy Postier to be sure they have all current supplies.

### Meeting Adjourned


A motion was made to adjourn the meeting. It was seconded and unanimously passed.


Dr. James Kay "Jim" Johnston was born on December 25, 1934 while his parents, Layton and M. Grace (nee Arnold) Johnston, were passing through Birmingham, Alabama. After numerous moves, and attending 13 different schools, Jim and his parents settled in Pasadena, Texas where he graduated from high school in 1953.

From 1953 to 1993 he was a Sea Bee (UTCS) in the Naval Reserves and was recalled to active duty for Desert Storm, serving in the Philippines and the Persian Gulf Theater of operations.

Jim married Anita L. Wright in January of 1959. They had no children. Jim's career included teaching at the public school, college, university and adult levels. Jim and Anita moved to Oak Harbor in1981

For several years he was a member of the Council of Officers of Clan Johnston/e in America. He was especially involved in assisting the rewriting and wording of the CJA Bylaws when the organization was preparing to become a non-profit. Jim enjoyed many activities, including music (amateur fiddle player); building, remodeling and repair projects; and hosting a tent for Clan Johnston/e at Scottish Highland Games in Western Washington. He was the main designer in developing guidelines for selecting scholarship recipients for CJA. We lost Jim earlier this year. He will be sincerely missed.

### Annandale Center celebrates Scottish dance & culture

When Pat Johnston was deciding how to spend her retirement years, she went back to her roots.

Pat and her late husband, Steve Johnston, are from long lines of Scottish ancestry, something she has celebrated since attending Highland games as a child. Stephen Johnston passed away in Sept. of 2012. Both were long-time members of Clan Johnston/e in America, and Pat still serves on the organization, assisting in the financial records part of the organization.

Steve was a Life member of CJA, joining the group in its early stages of development, serving in many positions over thirty-plus years. Both Pat and Steve have served in multiple Scottish groups over the years.

Both Pat and Steve were looking forward to the culmination of a dream to open such a Scottish Arts center. Unfortunately, Steve passed away just prior to the opening of the center.

In March 2013, Johnston and her daughter, Amy Mooney, joined forces to open the Annandale Center, Scottish Dance and More in downtown Cary. They had purchased a house adjacent to the Cary Arts Center over three years previously and began to renovate it to suit their needs.

While private instructors offer dance lessons in the area, Annandale is the only stand-alone facility in the Triangle dedicated to Scottish dance. The name comes from the ancestral home of the Johnston clan associated with the family of Pat's husband, Steve Johnston.



The center offers a variety of classes, from the social Scottish country dancing to competitive Highland dancing as well as step dancing, piping and creative movement. Daughter Amy Mooney, a champion dancer, has been practicing the sport since she was 9 years old.

Pat is quoted as saying, "The one thing I love about competitive Highland dancing is that the friendships are lifelong." She added, "It is character-building. You want to win, but your competitors are your friends and you are cheering each other on."

Highland dancing refers to the centuries-

There is more to Annandale Center than just dancing and piping. Pat stated she would "like to have lectures on how to wear a kilt, how to speak Gaelic, Scottish cooking and so many more."




